



Wim Vijverberg is a Professor of Economics and Executive Officer of the Ph.D. Program in Economics at the City University of New York Graduate Center. His areas of specialty lie at the intersection of labor economics, econometrics, and development economics. Particular areas of interest are the determinants of wage earnings and self-employment income in low-income countries; the effect of the investment climate on small-scale enterprises; the econometric modeling of clustered sample data; the application of flexible distributional assumptions; and applications of spatial econometric techniques.

He has published over fifty articles, which have appeared in the top rank of general journals (e.g., *Journal of Political Economy*, *Economic Journal*, *Review of Economics and Statistics*, *International Economic Review*, *Economica*) and in the top specialized journals (e.g., *Journal of Econometrics*, *Journal of Development Economics*, *Journal of Human Resources*, *Journal of Public Economics*). Though a great deal of his work is “applied” in that it uses econometric techniques to analyze and test theories, he has also made significant methodological contributions.

He holds a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Pittsburgh. Before joining the City University of New York Graduate Center, he was on the faculty at the University of Texas at Dallas, Illinois State University and the University of Hawaii, and held a post-doctoral fellowship at the Economic Growth Center of Yale University.
